If no label is provided you may be able to print one at the company's website. Even if no labels are available, many places collect those used

cartridges for recycling and re-filling. Look for collection bins at your office supply store.

Energy Saving Practices: Sleep Vs. Shutdown

When a computer is shut down, it takes time to boot it back up. However, while a computer in "sleep mode" boots up faster, sleeping computers still use energy, although 20-50 times less than when the computer is being used. So what is a good compromise? Adjust your power settings so that your computer enters sleep mode after a few minutes of inactivity. Then, at the end of the day, shut it down completely. Also, despite common belief, did you know that it does NOT harm your computer to frequently shut it down and start it up again? It doesn't take any more energy, either.

Clear Your Browser's Cache

Every web browser stores a cache of the websites you visit, to reduce bandwidth usage and server load. This is called the browser's cache. Clearing it occasionally can make some websites run smoother and free up space on your computers hard drive if it's running low. If you are using **Internet Explorer 8**,

here are instructions for clearing your cache. Other versions and other browsers will have a similar procedure to perform this maintenance.

1. Once your browser is open, click the Tools menu.
2. Click on Delete Browsing History
3. Select Temporary Internet Files
4. Click the Delete button near the bottom of the window to delete your temporary files (i.e. clear your cache).

Note: If you want the browser to automatically clear the cache whenever you close it, click the Advanced tab. Click to check the box next to the Empty Temporary Internet Files folder when browser is closed option (in the section labeled Security). Click OK. This will delete everything except cookies. Note: IE8 has a "feature" which retains some cookies even after you clear your cache if you do not UNCHECK the "Preserve Favorites Website Data." If you truly need to clear your cache, you will want to uncheck this!
